# **MEETING MINUTES**

### JUNE 13, 2015 HAVRE, MT

### Minutes of the June 13, 2015 Meeting Montana Street Rod Association

The June 13, 2015 meeting of the Montana Street Rod Association was called to order by Bob Degenhardt, President at 1:00 PM. The meeting was held in one of the fair-ground buildings in Havre, Montana. A thank you was given to Barb Salerno for making the arrangements for the use of the space.

The membership book was passed around. There were no guests at this meeting. The small meeting attendance was noted and a comment was made that the most successful meetings are the winter meetings held in Bozeman and at the NSRA Appreciation Day/Safety Inspection held in Butte in May.

The organization has gained one new business sponsor - Dark Horse Customs. There was a question as to whether they had received their sponsor plaque.

A motion to dispense with the reading of the minutes from the previous meeting was made by Greg Staples. It was seconded by Tony Patrick. The motion passed. Steve Sorg made a motion to accept the minutes as published in the latest newsletter. The motion was seconded by Greg Staples. The motion passed.

Marilyn Patrick, Secretary, reported that letters had gone out to former members reminding them of the opportunity to rejoin MSRA. No other secretarial activity was reported.

The treasurer's report was given by Greg Staples. Please refer to the report in this newsletter for details. A tax deductible form is available to all members and clubs. A motion to accept the treasurer's report was made by Tony Patrick and seconded by Judy Sorg. The motion passed.

Roger Boom, who was not present at the meeting, had reported that of the eight sponsor clubs, seven had requested MSRA plaques to be given out at their individual car shows. It was reported that Bob Degenhardt and Steve Sorg had chosen the winner of the Livingston Wheels show.

### **Committee Reports:**

Membership - Bob Degenhardt reported that MSRA has 35 business sponsors, 8 car club sponsors and 51 regular memberships. My Canvas Auto had sent a business card to be used for their newsletter advertising. Bergren Transmission and Silent Knight had not yet paid their 2015 business sponsorships.

Scholarship - The visit with Jeff Kraus at the winter meeting was again discussed. There is an individual that would like to set up a pass-through organization to distribute scholarship

monies collected for the use of two-year colleges. This organization was approved by the Board of Regents in May. Steve Sorg reported that he would be working through the summer to get our scholarship program ready by fall. He would like the approval of the MSRA membership to become a part of this group for our funds to be distributed. Steve talked about his "back-up" plan. His plan is to distribute \$500.00 to each of the following schools: Fort Peck Community College, Miles City Community College, City College (Billings), MSU-Northern (Havre), Helena College, and Highlands College of Montana Tech (Butte). There was some discussion about omitting Helena College as the Helena Valley Timing Association generally donates a generous amount from their car show. What specific groups of students would be the recipients of the scholarships were discussed. There will be a vote at the fall meeting.

### Old Business:

There are numerous rod runs/car shows coming up. Helena will host their "Blast from the Past" on June 26-28, 2015. The Pioneer Street Rods will host their charity cruise on July 11, 2015 in conjunction with the Montana Folk Festival.

### **New Business:**

A proposed change to the by-laws, Article 8, Section 4, which requires the treasurer to maintain a dual signature check account, was discussed. It was reported that with officers in different cities, this proposed change will not work well. Greg Staples said that the signature cards have not been changed since he took office. In order to make any change, the bank will need the minutes of the meeting where the change was discussed and voted on.

The new proposed change suggested by Greg reads as follows: Require the treasurer to maintain a dual signature checking account that requires two signatures on each check that could be a current officer and another board member. A motion was made by Greg Staples and seconded by Tony Patrick to accept this new change. The motion passed.

The next MSRA meeting will be held on Sunday, October 4, 2015 at 10:00 AM in Townsend, Montana in conjunction with Townsend's Fall Fest.

There were no announcements.

A motion to adjourn was made by Greg Staples and seconded by Tony Patrick. The meeting adjourned at 2:00 PM.

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
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
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


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### TIPS 'N TRICKS

- ➤ Using a zip tie to check travel on an item. Use this when setting up the stops on power windows tie a zip tie around the item and when it bottoms out or reaches where you want, you have your location marked. I have used this for other applications when I have been working alone, such as measuring travel on a M/C rod to see if it was bottoming out and also for measuring shock travel and rod length. Just put a zip tie around the rod and see where it is after maximum compression.
- > Drill holes in leaf springs with a regular bit using white Elmer's wood glue for coolant.
- > To remove tension spring, open the hood/trunk to the highest point, slip in washers between the springs, wrap in duct tape, so they don't fly apart and slowly close, the spring ends will slip out easily, reverse to install..
- ➤ A very useful and simple trick a old guy taught me when I first started working on cars. Use 2+2(aka carb cleaner) when working with rubber parts. Such as:

  Any time you are pushing a rubber hose over a nipple, first spray a small squirt of 2+2 in the hose end. It will slip right on. Then 5 sec later when the 2+2 dries the hose is stuck on. Work great when forcing a hose that's just a little 2 small over and nipple that's just a little too big.
  - Also works great when sliding hose clamps over the outside of a hose. Those damn squeeze clamps that never open up enough even when the pliers are maxed out. The clamp just doesn't want to slide over the hump in the hose. Spray 2+2 on the outside of the hose. That clamp will slide right back. Use again to go back together.
- ➤ For my business I need to keep gas receipts and records of maintenance on my vehicles. I found that unused check register books that are outdated work great for keeping records. I just write in the amount every time I fill up with gas or record what I repair on the vehicle. I start a new record every year. Keeping a handy record of oil changes in the book works great.
- When you are trying to bend some brake line or fuel line and you get a small kink or you flatten it through a turn. You take a crescent wrench and make it so it fits snug over a round part of the tube then you slip it over the kink in the narrow part and work it until the kink is out or useable.
- ➤ When trying to get the filler/drain plugs out of rear ends or trannys and they are really tight and you are working on jack stands use a small bottle jack to push up on your breaker bar be sure you are pushing to loosen saves a lot of grief and busted knuckles.

# **NSRA Vehicle Safety Inspection**

Montana Street Rod Assocation encourages you to have your vehicle inspected at any NSRA Show or at the NSRA Appreciation Day held in Butte each year

The specialty vehicles NSRA members own are built to be driven on the streets and highways. They are used to transport people, often to far off locales for recreational enjoyment. The National Street Rod Association® is dedicated to vehicle safety and backs it up with a program that gives every owner the opportunity to have his/her vehicle safety inspected for free as often as they want with a strong emphasis on having it done at least once each year.



The NSRA Vehicle Safety Inspection Program is completely voluntary, and includes 23 different items ranging from the lighting system to suspension (see list that follows), and the sole purpose of the safety inspection is to advise the vehicle owner of problem areas, either real or potential. As an "advisory" type inspection, it is only used to call the owner's attention to something which may have been overlooked. The inspection is not mandatory and has no effect on entering or taking part in NSRA events.



Even though this program is totally voluntary, the number of vehicles inspected grows every year. The NSRA Vehicle Safety Inspection is offered at each of the thirteen annual NSRA events, and at hundreds of independently produced activities all across the country. The program has become so popular, in fact, that each spring there is a growing number of "Safety Runs" where the main theme is only the Safety Inspection to make sure the vehicles are ready for another season of trouble

free, safe fun.

While more and more specialty vehicle owners recognize the benefits of having their vehicles safety inspected every year, there is one group of them that is even more keenly aware of the program's value; the guys and gals that make up the all volunteer

NSRA Safety Inspection Teams. There is one of these teams in every state, and in areas where the number of enthusiasts is more heavily concentrated there are additional teams so that as many of them as possible will have the opportunity to take advantage of the safety teams' services and expertise.

These Safety Inspection Teams are providing a very worthwhile service for the National Street Rod Association, but what they are offering for free to the individual enthusiast is much more important...an extra set of eyes to notice a potentially life threatening condition before it becomes more of one. There are approximately 800 people involved in making the NSRA Vehicle Safety Inspection Program work, and they are do more than just talk about vehicle safety...they make it a reality!

Considering the number of miles street rodders accumulate year after year on their street rods, this is a very safe hobby. With the emphasis NSRA puts on safety combined with the care street rodders put into their vehicles when constructing and maintaining them and the services provided by the NSRA Safety Inspection Teams, there is every reason to believe it will remain a safe hobby well into the future.

While attending an NSRA National event, take a few minutes to visit the Safety Inspection Area and learn a little more about this great program first hand...take the time to have your vehicle safety inspected...or simply note the number of NSRA Safety Inspection Verification Stickers on the windshields of the vehicles you look at. Vehicle safety is an important part of our hobby and most all enthusiasts recognize that fact and are doing something to prove it... they are having their vehicle safety inspected every year.

### **Vehicle Safety Inspection Requirements**

### Required Equipment

- 1. Horn: Electric only.
- 2. **Speed Indicator**: Speedometer or calibrated tachometer at 65 mph.
- 3. **Rear View Mirror**: One inside or outside on driver's side of vehicle.
- 4. Glass: Must be safety plate, lexon, or tempered glass.
- 5. Lighting: Hi-beam; low-beam; tail; brake; license.
- 6. Windshield Wiper: Electric or vacuum operated.
- 7. **Automatic Transmission Lockout**: Neutral and/or park start only.
- 8. **Tires**: 3/32 tread acceptable. Must meet D.O.T. specifications.
- 9. **Steering** No excessive "play" (2" radius max.) or binding; system must be safely mounted.
- 10. **Throttle Linkage**: Must not travel past center.

- 11. Fuel System: Check Vent on Trunk and Interior Mounted Tanks; no clear, plastic lines allowed. No leaks.
- 12. Exhaust System: No Leaks: Must pass rear edge of front door and exit exhaust away from vehicle.
- 13. **Self-aligning Rod End Bearings**: Check for fractures, insert sloppiness or binding.
- 14. Shock Absorbers: One per wheel, no leaks, 2" travel in each direction.
- 15.**Brakes**: Four-wheel brakes, no leaks, check brake pedal travel, no copper tubing, check length of flexible lines.
- 16. **Scrub Line**: No steering, suspension or chassis components should be below this line.

### Recommended Equipment: May be reason for failure

- 1. Windshield: Should be AS-1.
- 2. **Shift Pattern**: Shift pattern should be visible except on three speed standard column shift.
- 3. **Fuel Lines**: Should be safely mounted and routed.
- 4. Parking Brake: Should be activated independent of vehicle's hydraulic system.
- 5. **Self-aligning Rod End Bearings**: Ball should have 1/8 inch spacer on each side of the ball if there is any misalignment. Rod ends should not have more than 10° misalignment. ROD ENDS and 4 BAR-PARALLEL RADIUS ROD SYSTEM rubber bushed ends should have a safety washer at least the same outside diameter as the housing or larger.
- 6. Brake Lines: Should be safely mounted and routed.
- 7. Chassis Fasteners: Self-locking nuts, lock-washers, safety wire, or cotter pins.

### For Your Safety

1. **Safety Equipment**: Fire extinguisher in driver/passenger compartment, seat belts, a third brake light and a dual master cylinder.

He loved to travel in the cars and to go to many different shows in and around Montana. The 1934 Sedan Delivery was the first car in which he made many trips. He thought the fun was driving and going places and seeing other people and cars. He had many friends around the Northwest and always loved going to different shows.

He also was a long time member of Coin Op Collectors Association and collected antique slot machines for many years. Since 2008 he enjoyed car shows and poker games. He did very well playing poker and he would go to various tournaments during the fall/winter.

Jerry along with Terry put on the Yellowstone Rod Run since 2003. Jerry loved doing the trophies and made a different one with a rusted car each year. He really enjoyed the show when it was held at Lionshead and meeting so many people and seeing so many cars. He would have wanted everyone to know that he loved life and always thought he enjoyed as many things as possible. He thought simple was better and doing what he loved made him happy.

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


